## Maleo Moratorium: a "win-win" for everybody

Well-known but imperiled, the endangered maleo bird (*Macrocephalon maleo*) has been called "Sulawesi's Bald Eagle". Found only on the island of Sulawesi, Indonesia, the iconic maleo is a central focus of AlTo's conservation efforts in the Mount Tompotika area. In August 2006, AlTo joined with local villagers, community groups, and government officials to launch a complete moratorium on the harvest of maleo eggs at Tompotika's critically-important nesting ground near

the village of Taima. Now nine months later, the moratorium has proven to be a roaring success for everyone involved. Since August, over 1000 eggs have been protected, and soon our team will record the 200th chick observed. Through AlTo's work, in just a few short months the decline of the maleo at Taima has been reversed! In fact, the actual number of chicks hatched is likely much higher: newly-hatched chicks emerge from the the sand in the dark of night, and only remain at the nesting ground for a few minutes before flying off into the forest. The AlTo team is experimenting with methods for better detecting and recording chicks during this narrow window.

Meanwhile, both the local community and government have shown strong support for the moratorium. Delighted to see this protected species making a recovery, the **district** government has recently signed an agreement

giving AlTo's team official management authority over the Taima nesting ground for five years, and has also begun making modest but regular financial and in-kind contributions to the effort. Likewise, the local village council has voluntarily extended the moratorium for another three years, noting that the people of Taima are now much better off than they were before. Where previously on a given day one or two men earned less than a dollar illegally selling a maleo egg as a status symbol, now each of the 64 former egg-poachers has a regular, part-time job as a guard, village women earn money providing meals, and a new community fund is purchasing cement for the construction of a new mosque.

Art Exchange to promote Conservation Awareness The AlTo team is currently hard at work raising funds for our **next new program launch**: a **much-requested and eagerly-anticipated Conservation Awareness Campaign**. In this Campaign, AlTo's Conservation Officers ("Nature Lover" college students from the Tompotika area – see Dec '06 newsletter) will travel throughout Tompotika, conducting workshops and meetings in schools and villages. The workshops will educate adults and children on the need for, and ways to achieve, conservation of their lands, waters, and wildlife—something Tompotikans have been repeatedly requesting since AlTo began work there.

To help underscore the fact that Tompotika's natural wonders are worthy of celebrating and conserving, dozens of decorated maleo birds are now being created in the Puget These decorated maleos will be paraded in Sound area. Vashon Island's Strawberry Festival in July, raising awareness of Tompotika in the US, and then they will travel to Indonesia. At the same time, maleos are being decorated in Indonesia which will travel to the US. In August, this glorious flock of decorated maleos will be paraded in Tompotika to help launch AlTo's new Awareness Campaign there. Then, some of the decorated maleos will continue to travel with the Awareness Campaign, while others will take up permanent posts at key locations such as airports, village centers, etc., serving as both emblems and witnesses of love and pride in Tompotika's natural heritage. Not only that, but creating them is, well... fun! There is still time to

Watch family groups of tiny primate tarsiers, search for maleo chicks by moonlight, take canoes to an uninhabited island of giant flying foxes, catch frogs for a biodiversity survey, spend time with local villagers, and take part in a parade to help launch the new Conservation Awareness Campaign.
